

CULEX ADULT HEAD SCALE CHARACTERS



Band of broad round scales → that lay flat just behind the eyes

Some erect forked scales of further back on head


Culex erraticus:



Flat scales on top of head are broad round scales

Long Forked scales of tare present further back

- = Culex pilosus
- = Culex peccator




Small scales are scattered on head, are longer than wide and usually falcate or

spatulate G

Erect forked scales also present.

= Culex pipiens, quinquefasciatus, restuans, salinarius, nigripalpus and territans, coronator and tarsalis

Culex Thorax



salinarius, restuans, territans, pipiens quinquefasciatus & erraticus have this middle patch of mesepimeron scales.

nigripalpus does not (rarely 1 or 2 scales)




FIG. 1. Lateral aspects of thorax of Culex subgenera Melanaconion and Machinstyrux. Detail of mesepimeron and mesepisternum for (A) C. (Mel.) opisthopus, (B) C. (Mel.) alratus, (C) C. (Mel.) erraticus, (D) C. (Mel.) iolambdis, (E) C. (Mel.) malrennani, (F) C. (Mel.) percator, (G) C. (Moch.) pilosus. (H) Illustration of lower mesepisternum measurement of width to depth, upper drawing for subgenus Melanaconion and lower drawing for C. (Mechinstyrax) pilosus.
